SECTION 1 ESSENTIAL INFORMATION ON CURRICULA

This section will answer some common questions you may have about selecting a curriculum



| Curriculum Overview

What is a Curriculum:

Curriculum typically refers to the knowledge and skills students are expected to learn, which includes the learning standards or objectives they are expected to meet; the units and lessons that teachers teach; the assignments and projects given to students; the books, materials, presentations and readings used in a course; and the assessments and other methods used to evaluate student learning.

Most private schools in Abu Dhabi offer one curriculum. However, some schools may have different "sections" within the same school where they offer two curricula. For example, you may find a school that has a "British" section which teaches the British curriculum and an "MoE" section which follows the UAE Ministry of Education curriculum.

Why Curricula Matter:

Knowing the different curricula is an important step in making an informed decision regarding school selection for your child. The curriculum will set the tone of your child's learning experience, assessment and associated qualifications, as well as the day-to-day academic and co-curricular activities they will be expected to engage in. Moreover, it will also help in mapping and preparing them for their future academic and professional career.

All Schools that Teach a Particular Curriculum are not the Same:

While the overall academic structure is similar, schools offering the same curriculum may also differ in a range of ways, such as co-curricular activities, facilities, fees, teaching methods, etc.

Schools may choose to offer one or more of these curricula either concurrently, or a stream within the school. For details on each curriculum, see Section 2 of this guide.

*Note: The IB framework serves as a curriculum organizer and offers a guide to achieve inquiry-based learning.



Key Considerations while Choosing a Curriculum:

We recommend you consider the following:

- Future plans: Where would you like your child to complete their higher education? Is your child's end-of-school qualification recognized by colleges and universities where you would like them to apply?
- Recognition in your home-country: Are the curricula and the associated assessments/qualifications recognized by your home country (applicable for non-UAE nationals)?
- Requirements to obtain a high-school equivalency certificate in the UAE: The Ministry of Education mandates minimum requirements for each curricula to provide a certificate indicating that your child has studied the equivalent of high school in the UAE (see Page 12 of this guide for details about equivalency).
- Prior school history: If your child is transferring from one curriculum to another, how seamlessly can they transfer to the new curriculum?
- Your preferences about your child's learning experience: Do you prefer selfdirected learning, or teacher-led instruction, formal or informal assessment? What choice of subjects would you like your child to have? Etc.



Mandatory Subjects your Child will Study:

In addition to the subjects that your child will study at school as part of their curriculum, the following subjects will also be taught depending on their nationality and faith.

These subjects promote the development of your child as a mindful individual who is aware and appreciative of the cultural and social diversity of the UAE.



ISLAMIC EDUCATION

Mandatory for all Muslim students of all nationalities.

Optional for non-Muslim students.

Arab students study Islamic Education in Arabic.

Non-Arab students study Islamic Education in English.

Some schools may offer Islamic Education in the language of instruction from Grades 1-11.



ARABIC

Mandatory for all students.

Arab students study Arabic as a first language.¹

Non-Arab students study Arabic as an additional language until Grade 9. Non-Arab students in Grades 10-12 may choose to study Arabic as an optional subject.



UAE SOCIAL STUDIES

Mandatory for all students in Grades 1-9.

Language of instruction depends on the school.



UAE MORAL EDUCATION

Mandatory for all students in Grades 1-12.

Language of instruction depends on the school.



1: Arab Students of Determination may apply to study Arabic as an additional language (i.e. Arabic for non-native/non-Arab speakers) provided they submit a physician's note and supporting documents with the request.

Assessments your Child has to Take:

Assessments are an important part of the teaching and learning process, as they help your child's teacher determine the most appropriate support your child needs to succeed. Throughout your children's learning journey, they will be given a range of assessments to evaluate their performance. Broadly, these include:

- Internal assessments conducted by the school to assess learning, such as mid-term tests or quizzes.
- O Board Exams: Assessments developed by recognized awarding bodies, such as GCSE, A-Level, BTEC, IB Dip., HSSC, Abitur, usually taken at the end of secondary/high school. See Glossary for a description of these exams.
- College/University Entrance Exams: assessments developed by recognized awarding bodies only for university entrance, such as SAT, ACT, BMAT, etc.
- EmSAT: The Emirates Standardized Test is a national system of standardized computer-based tests, based on United Arab Emirates national standards. These are administered to students in Grades 4, 6, 8 and 10 to track student achievement, and at the end of Grade 12 as the primary admission criteria for public and some private universities in the UAE.
- Standardized curriculum assessments: Assessments mandated by ADEK for each curriculum. You can find out more about the standardized assessment mandated for each curriculum in the next section.²



2. Students studying in the Bangladeshi, Canadian, Pakistani, and Philippine curriculum in Grades 3-9 must take any of the following standardized tests each year: NWEA-MAP®, GL-PT test series, ACER-ISA, ACER-IBT or EI-ASSET.


Transferring your Child from One Curriculum to Another:

You can transfer your child from one curriculum to another. However, here are a few things that you should keep in mind:

- The deadline to switch schools is in mid-October every year.
- Schools recommend not switching between curricula after your child has begun Grade 9 (or equivalent). The rationale behind this is to minimize any disruption to your child's academic success and wellbeing prior to the years leading up to university.

Also consider the following as you plan to switch your child's school:

- Which Grade/year will your child be accepted into? See the tables in the next section corresponding to each curriculum.
- O How will the academic transition be managed? Does your child need to build any background knowledge before they begin studying a new curriculum?
- What core and elective subjects are taught in the other curriculum? Will the language of instruction be the same or different from their prior school
- Other factors related to your child's mental and social wellbeing, such as their ability to adapt to a new environment, managing anxiety etc.



Understanding High School Equivalency and if your Child Needs One:

If your child studied a curriculum other than the Ministry of Education (MoE) curriculum in the UAE and wishes to apply for admission to university in UAE, they will require an equivalence certificate.

The Ministry of Education issues this equivalence certificate, declaring that your child has obtained a level of education equivalent to completing high school in the UAE.

There are some pre-requisites for obtaining this certificate, which include:

- Passing the Ministry of Education Arabic exam in Grade 12.
 - Native Arabic for Arab students
 - Non-Native Arabic for non-Arab students
- Muslim students must pass the UAE Ministry of Education Islamic Studies exam in Grade 12.
 - Islamic Studies for Arab students
 - Islamic Studies for non-Arab students
- Additional requirements, specific to each curriculum are regularly developed and updated by the Ministry of Education. Please refer to the Ministry of Education <u>website</u> for further information.




| I Know which Curriculum I Want my Child to Study. What's Next?

- 11. What are the school fees, etc.? Are there any additional costs, such as textbook costs, transportation fees etc. apart from tuition that I should be aware of?
- 12. How selective is the school? Will my child be guaranteed a spot?
- 13. If my child is switching from another school or another country, are there any special requirements they should meet in order to be eligible?
- 14. What provisions does the school have for the development of Arabic language skills in students?
- 15. What is your approach to extra-curricular activities?
- 16. Do you have arrangements for special needs/gifted children?
- 17. How does the school manage discipline, bullying, etc.?
- 18. How does the school support university admissions?



| The AMERICAN Curriculum

Overview

- Most American curriculum schools in Abu Dhabi follow the U.S. Common Core State Standards for English Language and Mathematics, and Next Generation Science Standards for Science.
- Students in secondary school (Grade 9 and onwards) studying in an American curriculum school can personalize their education experience by choosing from a range of elective subjects.



Progression

- Entry to Pre-Kindergarten typically begins at age 3.
- Students complete 12 years of schooling beyond Kindergarten.
- Typically, in high school, courses are expressed as "Credits", representing the number of hours of study the student engages in.
- Students graduate with a High School Diploma, a school-leaving qualification that reflects their academic work from Grades 9-12.
- The table below shows the academic journey that a student studying an American curriculum is expected to take:

Assessments

- Assessments in the American system may be internal (i.e. set and marked by the teacher), or external (MAP®, AP, etc.).
- Unlike most other curricula, there is no external exam or qualification that students must pass to obtain a high school diploma. Students only receive a Grade Point Average (GPA) as an indication of their academic achievement at the end of their schooling.
- Optional Advanced Placement (AP) Assessments are standardized tests taken by high school students to demonstrate mastery in subjects.
- High performance in an AP exam may be accepted by some colleges and universities as credits toward the student's bachelor's degree.
- In Grade 11, students can take the SAT or the ACT, two standardized tests that are a prerequisite for applying to colleges in the U.S.
- In Grade 8, 9 or 10, students may choose to take the PSAT (based on their relevant grade), a preparatory version of the SAT.
- All students in Grades 3-9 studying a U.S. curriculum have to take NWEA-MAP® or Iowa Assessments, in English (Reading/Language Usage), Mathematics and Science.

Accreditation

Schools may be accredited with one of five regional U.S. Accreditation agencies:

- American International Accreditation Association (AIAA).
- Middle States Association-Commissions on Elementary and Secondary Schools (MSA-CESS).
- New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC).
- Accrediting Commission for Schools-Western Association of Schools and Colleges (ACS-WASC).
- Cognia (previously AdvancED).



| The BANGLADESHI Curriculum

Overview

- The Bangladeshi school in Abu Dhabi follows the National Curriculum and Textbook Board approved Curriculum.
- Core subjects taught include Bangla, Mathematics, English, Science, Religion, Physical Education, Arts and Crafts, and Music.
- While in Bangladesh, students can choose to receive education in English or Bangla, the Bangladeshi curriculum in Abu Dhabi is taught in English.
- The Bangladeshi curriculum offers a smooth integration for students who wish to complete their higher education in Bangladesh.



Progression

- Entry to Kindergarten begins at age 4-5.
- Students complete 10 years of schooling to receive a Secondary School Certificate, or 12 years of schooling to qualify for a Higher Secondary School Certificate.
- After completing Grade 8, students may choose fixed combinations of subjects called "tracks". In Abu Dhabi, the two tracks offered are Business Studies/Commerce or Science.

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Assessments

The Bangladeshi curriculum school in Abu Dhabi offers the following examinations from Dhaka Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education:

- O Primary School Certificate (PSC), a national exam at the end of Grade 5.
- O Junior School Certificate (JSC), a national exam at the end of Grade 8.
- Secondary School Certificate (SSC), a national exam at the end of Grade 10.
- Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC), a national exam at the end of Grade 12.


Accreditation


Many Bangladeshi schools participate in affiliation schemes developed by the various curriculum and school education boards in Bangladesh e.g., Dhaka Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education (BISE).

- By participating in affiliation, schools establish a recognized association or 'partnership' with a board of their choice.
- Without affiliation, schools cannot deliver courses nor administer board examinations.
- Schools are granted affiliation (renewed every 4 years) upon the adherence to the Board's terms and conditions.




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| The BRITISH Curriculum

Overview

- While the UK has a national curriculum, independent (non-state funded) schools may choose to use it or implement a curriculum of their choice. Therefore, expect variation in the learning outcomes among British curriculum schools.
- The British National curriculum has the following compulsory subjects for students: Mathematics, English, Science, Design and Technology, History, Geography, Art and Design, Music, Physical Education, Computing and Ancient and Modern Foreign languages.
- British secondary school qualifications, such as GCSEs, IGCSEs and A-Levels are widely recognized for admission to universities in the UAE and abroad.



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Progression

The UK National Curriculum framework details what subjects are taught, and the standards children should reach in each subject. It is organized into blocks referred to as 'Key Stages' (KS), ranging from KS1 to KS4.

Foundation:

- While education is only compulsory from age 5, most schools structure their pre-school programs on the Early Years Foundation Stage Framework (EYFSF).
- Early years usually comprise Early Years Foundation Stage 1 (FS1) and Foundation Stage 2 (FS2).
- Your child must be 3 years old by 1st of September of the year of admission in order to be enrolled in FS1.

Key Stages:

- Beyond the Foundation years, the different levels of education are referred to as Key Stages. See the table below to understand the age to year mapping.
- Please note that the British system uses "Years" rather than Grades to place children.
- Year 2 corresponds to Grade 1, Year 3 corresponds to Grade 2 and so on.

Assessments

The following assessments are administered over the child's education journey in a British system:

- FS2: An Early Years Foundation Stage Profile is completed for each child by the teacher. This profile may be developed by the teacher through observation, generating a portfolio, or administering low stakes formative assessments.
- Year 1: A statutory phonics screening assessment, administered by the teacher. If the child does not do well enough, they have to take the test again in Year 2.
- Year 2: Statutory National Assessments delivered in English Reading, Grammar, Punctuation, Spelling and Mathematics. Whereas Science, writing, speaking and listening are teacher assessed.
- Year 6: National tests and teacher assessments in English & Mathematics; Teacher Assessments in Science.
- Year 10: Some students may take the GCSEs or IGCSE subject exams.
- Year 11: Students take the GCSEs/IGCSE or other national exam.
- Year 13: Students take the A-Level exams, an essential qualification for university entrance.

All students in Years 4-10 studying the British curriculum must take GL-PT test series (PTE, PTM, PTS) in English, Mathematics and Science.



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
Accreditation

- Schools may voluntarily participate in accreditation schemes, such as inspection through the British Schools Overseas (BSO), endorsed by the Department for Education (DfE), UK.
- Such accreditation ensures that the school provides students with the skills and qualifications required to enter/re-enter the British education system.




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| The CANADIAN Curriculum

Overview

- Public education in Canada is decentralized. This implies that each province can develop its own curriculum and standardized assessments.
- Canadian curriculum schools in Abu Dhabi follow either the Alberta or Nova Scotia curriculum framework.
- Apart from statutory subjects, such as English Language Arts,
 Mathematics, Science and Social Studies, curricula from Canada have specific subjects to build a range of competencies:
 - Alberta: Career and Life Management, Physical Education, Career and Technology Studies and a range of elective subjects to suit the students' interests.
 - Nova Scotia: Healthy Living, Personal Development and Society, Global Studies and a range of electives to suit the students' interests.



Progression

- Entry to Kindergarten begins at age 4-5.
- Students complete 12 years of education to receive a High School Diploma if they complete the credits required by their respective province.

Assessments

Alberta:

- Annual Provincial Achievement Tests (PAT) for Grades 3, 6 and 9.
- Internal assessments (coursework) and external assessment (exams) are used to award students a High School Diploma at the end of Grade 12.
- Alternatively, students can opt to obtain a Certificate of High School Achievement by completing lesser coursework. However, this Certificate does not meet the minimum requirements for university admission in Canada.

Nova Scotia:

- O Nova Scotia Assessments for Grades 2, 6 and 8.
- Nova Scotia Examinations in English and Mathematics in Grade 10.
- The High School Diploma is awarded on the basis of internal assessment and the result of the Nova Scotia Examinations.

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Accreditation

Alberta:


- Alberta Education works with international schools to enable them to offer the Alberta curriculum and its associated qualification, the Alberta High School Diploma, to students.
- To become an Alberta Accredited International School (AAIS), schools must undergo a process of school inspection and continuous monitoring of the school's compliance with the requirements of accreditation.

Nova Scotia:

- An international school (public or private) may be approved to offer a Nova Scotia program, giving their students the opportunity to graduate with a Nova Scotia High School Diploma.
- To be accredited, schools undergo an annual cycle of inspection, undertaken by inspectors from the Nova Scotia Department of Education, against recognized standards and expectations.

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| The FRENCH Curriculum

Overview

- The French Department of Education has developed a national curriculum, called the Common Foundation of Knowledge, Skills and Culture.
- This national curriculum identifies the knowledge, skills and attitudes essential for a student to be successful in his educational and personal life and as a future active citizen.
- French schools in Abu Dhabi adopt the generic system classification used in schools within France. They do not include Saturday schooling or half days on Wednesdays as still practiced in some schools in France.



Progression

- The schooling system is divided into 5 distinct stages, cycles 1 to 5, starting from the Kindergarten till Grade 12.
- Oycle 5, the final cycle, contains the last year of compulsory education (Seconde). Students typically extend study into Première if they intend to go to university and pursue an academic route.
- When extending into Première, three baccalaureat streams are available: professionnel, technologique and général, with Abu Dhabi French schools offering only the general. This track prepares students for higher education.
- The Baccalaureat Général has recently been revised in order to introduce more flexibility for students and to provide a more personalized educational experience. The Baccalaureat Général however, still includes compulsory and non-compulsory subjects.

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Assessments

- Statutory assessments are held at the start of the academic year, and are conducted in Grade 1 (Cours Preparatoire), Grade 2 (Cours Elementaire), Grade 4 (Cours Moyen 1), Grade 6 (Sixieme), and Grade 10 (Seconde).
- At the end of Grade 9 (Troisieme), students take four written assessments in French, Mathematics, History and Sciences, a presentation project and an interview. Students must meet the statutory requirements; however, student outcomes do not determine future educational options. Successful students are awarded the Diplome National du Brevet (DNB).
- At the end of Grade 12 (Terminale), students take the Baccalaureat Général, a national standardized assessment required to pursue higher education. Upon graduating, students are presented with one Baccalaureat certificate, detailing all subjects studied and their attainment in each.

Accreditation

- In order to be accredited as a French educational institution, schools outside of France are subject to inspection by the Agency for French Education Abroad (AEFE). This ensures compliance to the standards and expectations of the French educational system.
- Certification is granted for the whole school and is regularly updated through self-evaluation and inspection, as part of a five-year cycle. This is additional to the statutory inspection of all schools in Abu Dhabi.



| The GERMAN Curriculum

Overview


- Public education in Germany is decentralized, i.e. states are responsible for developing their curricula and assessments. Consequently, German schools in Abu Dhabi offer the curriculum of the state they are affiliated with.
- At present, there is only one German school in Abu Dhabi. It offers the Thuringia curriculum, with German as the language of instruction.
- Play-based learning is emphasized in the Kindergarten years. On the other hand, in primary school, German, Science and Mathematics are allocated greater time than other subjects.
- The key differentiating feature of the German system is that after primary school (Grundschule), students are sorted into different streams/tracks in secondary education that can lead to different career pathways.



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Progression

- Kindergarten begins at the age of 3 and lasts 3 years.
- Primary school (Grundschule) is from Grades 1-4.
- For the German School in Abu Dhabi, students are placed in one of the following tracks at the end of Grade 5:
 - Hauptschule prepares students for vocational education;
 - Realschule an intermediate level of education, with a broad range of educational options;
 - Gymnasium for study at higher education institutions;
 - Gesamtschule a combination of the Hauptschule, Realschule and Gymnasium.
- The German school in Abu Dhabi offers all tracks. Typically, a majority of students undertake the Gymnasium track to attend university.
- Students have the option of transitioning from one track to another until Grade 8.
- Students following the Realschule track have the option of leaving school and transferring into vocational training at the end of Grade 10, or alternatively, with sufficiently good grades, transferring to Gymnasium in order to complete the Abitur (university entrance exam) in Grade 12.

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Assessments

- In the Kindergarten years, students are assessed by means of teacher observation and assessment of emotional and cognitive development, language, social behavior, artistic and gross and fine motor skills.
- In primary Grades, teachers assess students against standards provided by the respective curriculum framework.
- Students in the Abu Dhabi German school take competency tests at the end of Grades 3, 6 and 8 in German, English and Mathematics.

- At the end of Grade 6, students obtain the German Language certificate by taking an exam.
- Students in the Realschule track are given the opportunity to take the Realschulabschluss exam at the end of Grade 10. It usually consists of both written and oral assessments. With this qualification, students may choose to enroll in a vocational training institute, or transfer to a Gymnasium, provided they have sufficiently good grades.
- The German International Abitur Examination (Deutsches Internationales Abitur/DIA) is the more prestigious version of the German Abitur (school leaving exam) at the end of Grade 12. Part of the written and oral exams for this diploma are taken in an international language, which is English in the case of Abu Dhabi.

Accreditation

- The German Schools Abroad program ensures that the international schools offer an education standard equivalent to that of local schools in Germany. Schools are externally inspected by the German government authorities once every 3 years for quality assurance.
- The German school in Abu Dhabi is sponsored by the German Embassy and recognized officially as a "German School Abroad", meaning that all report cards and certificates are the same as those issued in Germany.

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| The INDIAN Curriculum

Overview


- In India, several curriculum and school education boards govern the education system. These bodies develop syllabi, resources and standardized examinations against the National Curriculum Framework for Grades 9-12.
- Such bodies include the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE), the Council for the Indian School Certificate Examinations (CISCE) and the Kerala State Education Board (KSEB).
- Indian schools within Abu Dhabi affiliate to either the CBSE or KSEB.



Progression

- While compulsory education begins from age 6, most Indian schools offer two to four years of pre-school education to prepare children for entry to formal schooling at age 6.
- The Academic year for Indian schools runs from April to March.
- Students complete 10 years of schooling to obtain a Secondary School Certificate (SSC) or 12 years of schooling to obtain a Higher Secondary School Certificate (HSSC).
- Students in the KSEB-affiliated schools may choose between Science or Commerce streams for Grade 11 and 12.
- Grade 9-10 students in the CBSE-affiliated schools study 2 languages, Mathematics, Science, Social Science, Art, Health and Physical Education and 2 electives of their choice. A skill subject and an academic subject.
- For Grades 11-12, CBSE students must study Hindi, English and choose from a wide range of skill-based or academic subjects.

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Assessments

- Assessments at the primary level are mostly internally developed and administered by schools.
- For CBSE students:
 - The All India Secondary School Examination (AISSE) is conducted at the end of Grade 10 to award a secondary school certificate.
 - The All India Senior School Certificate Examination (AISSCE) is awarded at the end of Grade 12.
 - These examinations are designed and administered by the Central Board of Secondary Education, India.
- For KSEB students:
 - The Kerala Board of Public Examinations (KBPE) develops and marks end of year examinations administered in Grade 10, including languages, Mathematics and Sciences.
 - Students then take the Grade 11 and Grade 12 (referred to as HSE+1 and HSE+2 respectively) exams to earn a Higher Secondary Certificate.
- All students in Grades 3-9 studying the Indian curriculum must take El-ASSET or ACER-IBT assessment in English, Math and Science.

Accreditation

- Indian schools are required to participate in affiliation schemes developed by the various curriculum and school education boards in India, e.g., Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) and Kerala State Education Board (KSEB).
- O By participating in affiliation, schools establish a recognized association or 'partnership' with a board of their choice. Without affiliation, schools cannot deliver courses nor administer associated examinations up to Grade 12.

| INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE (IB)*

Overview

- International Baccalaureate (IB) is an international framework designed by the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO) and is implemented in many countries around the world.
- Three IB programs are offered by schools in the UAE:
 - The Primary Years Program (PYP)
 - The Middle Years Program (MYP)
 - The Diploma Program (DP)



Progression

- The Primary Years Program is a curriculum framework rather than a set of standards. This means that schools may choose to follow the curriculum content (e.g., Mathematics, English, Science) of another system, e.g., British or American, through the philosophy and teaching and learning framework provided by the IB Primary Years Program. Ask your school for information about the content standards it follows.
- The Middle Years curriculum framework comprises 8 subject groups, and schools are required to provide at least 50 hours of teaching time for each subject group in each year of the program.

*Note: The IB framework serves as a curriculum organizer and offers a guide to achieve inquiry-based learning.

- The Diploma Program consists of three core elements:
 - Theory of Knowledge in which students reflect on the nature of knowledge
 - Extended Essay which is an independent, self-directed piece of research culminating in an essay
 - Creativity, Activity, Service in which students complete a project
- In addition to these core elements, students may choose courses from various subject groups. Students must choose six subjects in total: A subject from each of the subject groups, Language and Literature, Language Acquisition, Individuals and Societies, Science, Mathematics and either one from the Arts or a second from one of the other groups.

Assessments

- Primary Years Program: Students undertake a collaborative, transdisciplinary inquiry process to identify, investigate and offer solutions to a real-life problem, and present their project as part of a mandatory exhibition.
- Middle Years Program:
 - Mandatory MYP personal project: In the final year of the MYP (Grade 10), students complete a long-term project that is designed as an independent learning experience of approximately 25 hours.
 - Optional MYP eAssessment: Participation in optional MYP assessments provides IB-validated grades based on examinations and course work, including Personal Project, Onscreen exams and coursework ePortfolio.
- O Diploma Program:
 - For the IB DP, results that students receive are determined by their performance against standards set by the IBO.
 - Both internal and external assessments are used to determine the final results.
 - In the DP, students receive grades ranging from 7 to 1, where 7 is the
 highest. A student's final Diploma result score is made up of the
 combined scores for each subject. The diploma is awarded to students
 who gain at least 24 points (out of a possible 45).
- All students in Grades 3-9 studying the IB curriculum must take either of the following: NWEA-MAP®, GL-PT test series, ACER-ISA, EI-ASSET in English, Mathematics and Science.

Accreditation

- In order to teach IB programs, schools must be authorized by IBO. Every school authorized to offer IB programs is known as an IB World School.
- Schools can be authorized for individual IB programs, or for all programs offered by IBO.



| The JAPANESE Curriculum

Overview

- The Japanese Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology (MEXT) develops a national curriculum and supports the many local boards of education.
- The Japanese school in Abu Dhabi predominantly offers admissions to Japanese national children, or children of Japanese women.
- The language of instruction in the school is Japanese for all subjects except Arabic, English, Social Studies and Moral Education.
- From Elementary to the end of Lower Secondary schools, a compulsory program of Mathematics, Science, Arts, English, Islamic Studies and Japanese is taught to all students in mixed ability classes.
- O Students usually travel to Japan to pursue secondary education.



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Progression

- Japan categorizes the schooling system in a 6-3-3 pattern, with 6 years of 'Elementary' schooling after Kindergarten, 3 years of 'Lower Secondary', and finally, 3 years of 'Upper Secondary' schooling.
- In Abu Dhabi, students graduate at the end of 'Lower Secondary' (Grade
 9) and typically, continue education by taking the general or specialized streams at other institutions appropriate to their requirements and needs.
- The table below provides a breakdown of the different Grade levels and corresponding ages of students according to the Japanese system:

Assessments

- Pre-school assessments are internally developed and conducted through informal teacher observation.
- The Ministry of Education in Japan develops and produces standardized statutory assessments at the end of Grades 5, 6 and 9.
- Assessments are administered in several subjects, including Japanese, Mathematics, Social Studies and Science, with the addition of English in Grade 9.
- In Abu Dhabi, results from the assessment are used internally to inform the teaching and learning process and are used as part of the transfer process at the end of Grade 9.

Accreditation

- The Japanese School in Abu Dhabi is an embassy school, sourcing all teaching staff via the Japanese government. This ensures recognized teaching quality and assures parity between the teaching and learning experience in the Japanese school in Abu Dhabi with that in the Japanese education system.
- Regular progress reports are compiled and reported by the principal directly to the Japanese government, primarily as a quality assurance measure regarding educational provision.



| The PAKISTANI Curriculum

Overview

- Pakistan has a national curriculum for early years to Grade 12, which is followed by all schools in the country and abroad.
- At the secondary level, education is also regulated by exam boards, that are responsible for administering exams and issuing end-of-school certificates based on results from those exams. There are multiple boards in Pakistan, e.g., the Federal Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education (FBISE), Lahore Board, Board of Secondary Education, Karachi, etc.
- In Pakistan, the language of instruction is Urdu, however in Abu Dhabi Pakistani private schools, the language of instruction tends to include both Urdu and English, dependent on the school and the individual subject.





Progression

- Schools are commonly divided into Kindergarten, Primary (1-5), Middle (6-8), Secondary (9-10) and Higher Secondary (11-12).
- The academic year for most Grades in the Pakistani system is from April to March, however for Grades 11 and 12 (Higher Secondary), the academic year is September to June.
- In Terminal Grades in secondary school (Grade 9 and 10), students may choose a combination of three subjects to study in addition to English, Urdu, Mathematics, Pakistan Studies and Islamic Studies.
- In Higher Secondary Grades (11-12), students must study four core subjects: English, Urdu, Pakistan Studies and Islamic Studies and three electives grouped into Pre-Medical, Pre-Engineering, General Science, Commerce and Humanities streams.

Assessments

Secondary School Certificate (SSC) (Grades 9 and 10):

- The Secondary School Certificate (SSC) is a qualification acknowledging the skills and knowledge of students up to Grade 10. The SSC examinations are comprised of two parts, one administered at the end of Grade 9 (part 1), and the other at the end of Grade 10 (part 2).
- For Pakistani private schools in Abu Dhabi, the SSC examinations are developed and provided by the Federal Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education (FBISE).

Higher Secondary School Certificate (HSSC) (Grades 11 and 12):

• The Higher Secondary School Certificate (HSSC) is a qualification implemented in the last two years of school. As with the SSC, the examinations are comprised of two parts, one administered at the end of Grade 11 (part 1), and the other at the end of Grade 12 (part 2) by the FBISE.

Accreditation

- Pakistani schools participate in affiliation schemes developed by the various curriculum and school education boards in Pakistan. For international Pakistani private schools, they must be affiliated with the Federal Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education (FBISE).
- By participating in affiliation, schools establish a recognized association or 'partnership' with the board. Without affiliation, schools cannot deliver courses nor administer board examinations.



| The PHILIPPINE Curriculum

Overview

- The Philippines has a national curriculum developed by the Department of Education.
- Schools in the Philippines are divided into Kindergarten, Elementary, Secondary and Senior High, as also implemented in Abu Dhabi Philippine schools.
- Ompulsory core subjects in both Elementary and Secondary schools include languages, Mathematics, Sciences, ICT, Physical Education and the Arts. However, in Grades 7 and 8, Technology and Livelihood Education (TLE) subjects are also introduced.
- In Senior High schools, the choice of career track defines content of subjects; typical tracks include Academic, Technical-Vocational-Livelihood, Sports, and Arts and Design. Students select a specialization track based on their aptitude, interests and school provision.





Progression

- Entry to Kindergarten begins at age 4-5.
- Students complete 12 years of education to receive a Senior High School Diploma upon completion of academic and non-academic requirements.

Assessments

- Assessments at the Kindergarten level are conducted through regular teacher observations. SREYA (School Readiness Early Years Assessment), ECCD (Early Childhood Care Development) checklist and other forms of assessment are utilized for this purpose.
- Statutory national curriculum assessments are administered at the end of elementary and junior phases of education, in Grades 6 and 10 respectively. Other reliable external assessments are administered to measure students' learning.
- In Grade 12, student achievement is measured through internal assessments as well as the Department of Education Basic Education Exit Assessment (BEEA). Following successful completion of academic and nonacademic requirements, Grade 12 students receive a Senior High School Diploma and Secondary Leaving Certificate.

Accreditation

- Schools overseas are accredited and registered by the Commission of Philippine Schools Overseas (CFO).
- Inspectors from the Philippines conduct annual school inspections, using defined standards to measure the school quality. Successful schools are granted annual licenses.
- The Embassy of the Philippines may also depute a representative, commonly a cultural attaché, to visit schools and assist with quality assurance and accreditation.

| The SABIS® Curriculum

Overview

- SABIS® is a global education network that has a presence in 20 countries. Originally from Lebanon, SABIS® runs non-selective, co-educational schools providing English-medium instruction to students through a rigorous academic program with regular testing.
- SABIS® schools are most commonly divided into Infant (K to Grade 2), Primary (Grades 3-6), Intermediate (Grades 7-9) and Secondary (Grades 10-12).

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Progression

- In Kindergarten, the focus is on literacy and numeracy with a mixture of classroom and specialist teachers.
- At the primary and intermediate levels, students are taught a range of subjects with English, Science and Mathematics as core subjects.
- In the secondary level, students stay with core courses but can choose other courses that help them to prepare better towards their future interests.
- SABIS® schools in Abu Dhabi offer one of two models:
 - Trilingual schools with Arabic, English and French.
 - A model, where students study Arabic and French as second and third languages depending on their passport/nationality.


Assessments

- In SABIS® Network schools, students take weekly computerized exams where they receive on-the-spot feedback and resources that enable them to review content on missed questions and then retake the test in the same session.
- Assessments are centrally prepared, with all students in the same grade, sitting the same test at the same time in the UAE and Gulf region.
 Students complete weekly, termly and final, end of year examinations.
- Career guidance commences in Grade 7 and supports students in making decisions on what external exams will be most beneficial for their university and career path.
- All students in Grades 3-9 studying the SABIS® curriculum must take any of the following assessments: NWEA-MAP®, GL-PT test series, ACER-ISA or EI-ASSET in English, Mathematics and Science.

Accreditation

All schools in the SABIS® network, are accredited by the following international agencies:

- National Council for Private School Accreditation (NCPSA).
- Accreditation International (AI), which requires schools to complete a self evaluation, submit a plan for continuous school improvement, and participate in on-site evaluations by peers every five years to maintain their accreditation status.
- Middle States Association Commissions on Elementary and Secondary Schools (MSA-CESS).

| The SPANISH Curriculum

Overview

- The Spanish government sets out a national curriculum for all schools to follow. There are three key stages: Primary Education, Compulsory Secondary Education and Baccalaureate curricula.
- Spanish is the language of instruction and the medium for the delivery of the curriculum.
- Non-Spanish speaking students can enter directly into the Spanish immersion program for the needed linguistic support.
- The curriculum is enriched through an English language program, blended into the weekly schedule at all levels of education.
- At present, there is only one Spanish school in Abu Dhabi, which offers the Early and Primary Years Programs.



Progression

- Children are eligible to enroll in the Early Years Program from ages 3-5, and the Primary Years Program from ages 6-11.
- The curriculum is made of two subject categories: Core subjects and specific subjects.
- Ocre subjects consist of:
 - Natural Sciences
 - Social Sciences
 - Spanish Language and Literature
 - Mathematics
 - First Foreign Language
- Specific subjects consist of:
 - Physical Education
 - Religion, or Social and Civic values as chosen by the parent/guardian
 - Artistic Education
 - Second Foreign Language

Assessments

- At the end of the third year of primary education, an assessment is administered to all students to evaluate their mastery of the skills and abilities in oral and written expression and comprehension, calculation and problem solving. This assessment is primarily used to indicate how the student can achieve their learning goals by the end of primary education and if any adjustments are necessary.
- At the end of the sixth year of primary education, a final evaluation will be carried out for all students to assess their mastery of Mathematics, communication and basic skills in science and technology according to the standards laid out in the Spanish National Curriculum. At the end of this evaluation, students are provided grades ranging from Insufficient (IN), Sufficient (SU), Good (B), Notable (NT), or Outstanding (SB).

Accreditation

 The Spanish School in Abu Dhabi is accredited by the Ministry of Education in Spain.



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| UAE MINISTRY OF EDUCATION Curriculum

Overview

- The Ministry of Education (MoE) is the UAE federal entity responsible for education in all public schools.
- It has developed a national curriculum framework for a broad range of subjects, based on a set of standards and learning outcomes. This curriculum is also taught in some private schools in Abu Dhabi.
- This curriculum has been designed with a special emphasis on UAE values and culture.
- Arabic is the medium of instruction for all subjects except English.
- The MoE curriculum is offered across all emirates in the UAE is recognized by colleges and universities in the UAE.





Progression

- Private schools administering MoE curriculum are divided into Kindergarten (KG1 to KG2), Cycle 1 (Grades 1-4), Cycle 2 (Grades 5-8) and Cycle 3 (Grades 9-12).
- The focus in the Kindergarten years is to develop social skills and provide opportunities for students to build their self-confidence.
- Throughout Grades 1-8, students study the following subjects: Islamic Education, Arabic, Social Studies, Moral Education, English, Mathematics, Sciences, Arts, Health and Physical Education, and Design and Technology.
- In cycle 3, students are allocated into one of two tracks: General or advanced. Within each track, all subjects are compulsory. While both tracks include Arts and Science subjects, the advanced track has more emphasis on high-level Mathematics and Sciences. Students can choose their track based on their capabilities and interests.

Assessments

- A diagnostic assessment for English and Mathematics is administered to all students in Grades 1-4. The assessment is developed externally by the MoE and provided to schools prior to administration. For the Arabic subject, a diagnostic assessment is administered to all students in Grades 1-12.
- Summative assessments for Grades 4-12 include formal externallydeveloped examinations for English, Mathematics, Arabic, Science, Islamic Education and Social Studies at the end of terms 1, 2 and 3.
- In Grade 12, students are required to sit Thanawiya al Amma examinations, dependent on the track they are enrolled in. Successful completion of the Grade 12 Thanawiya al Amma examinations allows students to apply for admission to federal universities within the UAE.
- All students in Grades 3-9 studying MOE curriculum must take ACER-IBT assessment in Arabic, Mathematics and Science (Arabic versions).

Accreditation

 The MoE is the highest educational authority for General Education in Abu Dhabi.

| Glossary

A-Level	Advanced Level (A-Level) refers to a subject-based qualification conferred as well as a school leaving qualification offered by educational bodies in the UK.
Abitur	Set of examinations taken in the final year of secondary school in Germany.
ACER-IBT	The Australian Council for Educational Research - International Benchmark Tests (ACER-IBT) is an internationally administered program of assessments to compare student performance globally, between grades and over time. The tests cover English, Mathematics, Science, Arabic Language and Reasoning for 9–16-year- olds.
ACER-ISA	The Australian Council for Educational Research - The International Schools' Assessment (ACER-ISA) is an assessment used by international schools and schools with an international focus to monitor student performance over time. The ISA tests core skills in mathematical literacy, reading and writing for Grades 3-10 and scientific literacy for Grades 7-10.

ACT	The ACT is an entrance exam used by U.S. colleges and universities to make admission decisions. The ACT tests skills related to English, Math, Reading and Science Reasoning.

AEFE	Agency for French Education Abroad: The AEFE is a government institution supervised by the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs. It is responsible for monitoring and managing the network of French schools outside of France.
AIAA	American International Accreditation Association: AIAA provides accreditation for schools outside of the U.S. that offer an international program or an American style curriculum.
AISSCE	All India Senior School Certificate Examination (AISSCE) also called Boards, is an examination conducted every year by the Central Board of Secondary Education on behalf of the Government of India at the end of Grade 12.
AISSE	All India Secondary School Examination (AISSE) are exams administered by the Central Board of Secondary Education on behalf of the Government of India at the end of Grade 10.
АР	Advanced Placement (AP) is a program in the U.S. and Canada created by the College Board which offers college- level curricula and examinations to high school students.
ВМАТ	The BioMedical Admissions Test (BMAT) is an admissions test for applicants to Medicine, Biomedical Sciences and Dentistry courses at a number of higher education institutions around the world.
BTEC	Stands for the Business and Technology Education Council (BTEC) is a qualification that's based on practical study rather than academic study. BTECs don't have to be an alternative to A-Levels. In fact, you can do them alongside your GCSEs and/or A-Levels, or you can do a standalone BTEC at college or university.



CBSE	Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) is the primary examining and awarding body for end-of-school qualifications in India and Indian Schools abroad.
Cognia	Previously called AdvancEd, Cognia is a nongovernmental organization that accredits primary and secondary schools throughout the U.S. and internationally.
CFO	Commission of Philippine Schools Overseas (CFO) is the government body that ensures that Philippine schools overseas follow the regulations of the government of Philippines and the Philippines Department for Education.
El-Asset	Educational Initiatives-Asset (ASSET) is a skill-based test that measures student's conceptual understanding in various curricula taught in India. It tests students in Grades 3-10 in English, Math and Science, and offers tests from Grades 5-10 in Social Studies and Grades 4-8 in Hindi.
EmSAT	The Emirates Standardized Test (EmSAT) is a national system of standardized computer-based tests, based on United Arab Emirates national standards. There are three types of tests: (1) Baseline: Administered to students at the beginning of their education journey, (2) Advantage Test administered to Grades 4, 6, 8 and 10 to track development of students, and (3) Achieve Test administered to Grade 12 as the primary test for admission into universities in the UAE.
FBISE	The Federal Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education (FBISE) is the examining body responsible for administering exams at the end of Grade 9, 10, 11 and 12 to students in Pakistan.

GCSE	General Certificate of Secondary Education (GCSE) refers to an academic qualification in a particular subject, taken in England, Wales, and Northern Ireland.
GL-PT	Granada Learning-Progress Test (GL-PT) assessment series measures and tracks progress of students in English (PTE), Math (PTM) and Science (PTS) for use in Reception (FS2/KG1/Pre-KG) till Year 10 (Grade 9).
GPA	Grade Point Average (GPA) is a number that indicates how well or how high a student scored in their courses on average. It is typically expressed on a scale between 1.0 and 4.0, where 4.0 is high and 1.0 is low.
HSSC	Higher Secondary School Certificate (HSSC) is an exam, and qualification, given to students at the end of 12 years of post-Kindergarten education in Pakistan and Bangladesh.
IB	International Baccalaureate (IB) refers to a category of international education programs. More details at www.ibo.org .
IB Dip.	The IB Diploma Program (IB Dip.) is a program of education with final examinations that prepares students, aged 16 to 19, for university and life beyond.
IB PYP, MYP, DP	International Baccalaureate Primary Years Program, Middle Years Program and Diploma Program (IB PYP, MYP and DP) are curriculum frameworks for children aged 3-12, 11-16 and 16-19 respectively.
IGCSE	International General Certificate of Secondary Education (IGCSE) is equivalent to the GCSE qualification, which is taken by students in Year 10-11 in the UK to prepare them for further pre-university level study, such as A-Levels.

PAT	Provincial Achievement Tests (PAT) are administered annually to all students for Grades 3, 6 and 9 in Alberta, Canada.
PSAT	Preliminary SAT (PSAT) is a primer/preparatory version of the SAT, and different versions of it are available to be administered to students in Grades 8, 9 and 10.
